A MESSAGE TO THE VILLAGE

FROM THE MAYOR

The Village is committed to having a green space within one mile or a 10-to-15-minute walk of every resident. The Village's latest acquisition is a 5-acre property located at 11855 SW 60th Avenue. It is the future site of Aleyda Mas Park. It is a special property because of its historical significance - being the original home of the Montgomery family, who were widely known as the founders of Fairchild Gardens.

Before the Mas property purchase, the Village acquired Gary Matzner Park – a 3.76-acre twoparcel site (formerly known as the Palermo Property) located on the southeast corner of Kendall Drive between 67 Avenue and 65 Court. The property's size and location near the more densely populated multi-family district in northwest Pinecrest make it an ideal site for additional green space.

In addition to these two parks, the Village touts eight more parks: Evelyn Greer Park, Coral Pine Park, Suniland Park, Flagler Grove Park, Red Road Liner Park, Veterans Wayside Park, Pinecrest Gardens, and the Village Green. I invite you to come out and spend time in the Village green spaces.

FROM THE MANAGER

I invite you to use the MyPinecrest App. It is an easy way to send a service request directly to staff and track the request's progress via the app. You can even send a photo along with your request.

Examples of service requests include reporting graffiti, potholes, and code compliance violations. Other app capabilities include watching Village Council meetings, reporting non-emergency issues, and viewing inspection updates.





ALEYDA MAS



The Village finalized the purchase of a 5-acre property located at 11855 SW 60th Avenue. The closing of the sale was January 24. The Village Council approved the purchase of the property during the 2023 November Council Meeting after discussing the possibility of acquiring it to use as a passive park during seven Council meetings, with the first being during the 2023 April Council meeting.

The property is located at the south end of the Village and will help fulfill the Village Council's commitment to having a green space within one mile or a 10-to-15-minute walk of every resident.

The property has exotic trees and plants, trails, a lagoon, and a large resort-like house. The Village plans to create a passive green space and indoor facility with its new acquisition.

The property was purchased for \$10M, which is \$2.5 M less than the average of two appraisals. The balance of the cost is a donation by the property owner in exchange for the property being named after Aleyda Mas, who is the wife of Jorge Mas, owner of MasTec, a construction and engineering company.

The property is horticulturally significant because it was originally owned by the Montgomery family, who are popularly known as the founders of Fairchild Gardens.

The Village will hire a consultant to commence the master planning process sometime between April and June.

Master planning is a process that engages residents to inform the design and use of the park. There will be a workshop where the master planning consultant will propose ideas for a passive park, with the goal being a resident-informed design.

RESTORING PINECREST'S NATURAL LEGACY

Pinecrest continues the initiative that started over ten years ago, Bringing Pines Back to Pinecrest, to restore the magnificence of the Dade Splash Pine and rejuvenate the Village's ecological landscape. This ambitious project seeks not only to revive the unique splendor of the Dade Slash Pine but also to cultivate a deeper sense of environmental stewardship within the community.

THE DADE SPLASH PINE: A UNIQUE FLORIDIAN TREASURE

Central to this endeavor is the preservation of the Dade Splash Pine (Pinus elliottii var. densa), an extraordinary pine species that thrives in the sandy soils and coastal plains of the region. With its captivating bark pattern resembling an artist's masterpiece and its slender needle-like foliage, the Dade Slash Pine stands as an emblem of resilience and natural beauty within Pinecrest. Despite facing challenges from habitat fragmentation and human encroachment, dedicated conservationists and environmental groups in Florida are working tirelessly to protect its native habitat and ensure its continued survival for future generations to appreciate and admire.

A NEW PINELAND PRESERVE AT HIDDEN PINE PATH

As part of the Bringing Pines Back to Pinecrest initiative, the Village established the Hidden Pine Path, which meanders through a designated pineland preserve dedicated to safeguarding the Dade Slash Pine and other indigenous flora and fauna. Displaying small pine trees will provide a unique opportunity to walk in a pine forest and promote an understanding of the vital role played by the Dade Slash Pine in maintaining the delicate ecological balance of the local environment. The Hidden Pine Path not only underscores the Village's commitment to ecological preservation but also fosters a deeper connection between the community and its natural heritage.

PINECREST PARKWAY BEAUTIFICATION PROJECT: EMBRACING THE DADE PINES

In a concerted effort to integrate the essence of the Dade Splash Pine into the fabric of Pinecrest, the upcoming Pinecrest Parkway Beautification Project will introduce the majestic Dade Pines to the commercial corridor, symbolizing a warm welcome to all who enter the Village. This endeavor, designed to enhance the visual appeal of the area and instill a sense of pride in the community, highlights Pinecrest's commitment to sustainable development and the conservation of its natural resources.

LOOKING AHEAD: A SHARED COMMITMENT TO SUSTAINABILITY



For me, every single YAC meeting has been incredible. Each encounter taught me something new. Seeing others volunteering in our community motivated me to do more. From being an official police liaison to working with park staff and the Village Council, YAC has allowed me to meet inspiring adult mentors and role models. This type of experience isn't readily available elsewhere.

One of my favorite initiatives with YAC is the YOUth Series presentations. Ranging from college interviews to the consequences of impaired driving, the benefits of fitness, and everything in between. These presentations help educate the youth in the community on a variety of issues. These talks are just one example of how YAC gets involved, alongside attending council meetings and volunteering at Village events.

YAC unites some of the best and most diverse members of our community under the common goals of education, empowerment, and community service. More than anything, YAC showed me my place in the community. It gave me the confidence to speak at council meetings and an understanding of how police and parks and recreation keep our Village vibrant and a beautiful place to live. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

POTABLE WATER LATERAL CONNECTION INSTALLATION PROJECT

This project will provide lateral connections from the potable water mains to new meter boxes for about 150 homes. The local utility, Miami-Dade Water and Sewer Department (WASD) will perform the work of tapping the main lines and installing the laterals and meter boxes. The Village will provide any needed restoration to the pavement, swale, and sidewalks. Each connection will require a permitted design and the Village has contracted with a professional engineering firm to provide those services. The final necessary studies and approvals are in progress and construction is expected to begin late spring 2024. The Public Works office notifies affected residents once the work is completed and provides step-by-step instructions on how to obtain potable water from WASD and plumbing permits from the Pinecrest Building Department.

STORMWATER

The Village commissioned a Stormwater Master Plan (SMP) in 2014 and adopted the plan in 2015. The adoption of a SMP is needed to obtain funding for projects from all levels of government agencies - county, state, and federal. The SMP analyzed the Village's drainage needs and provided a priority list of 15 basins (one being the highest priority). The Palmetto Island Drainage Project (Phase I) began in January of 2023 and was completed on July 3, 2023. The Village also has the five highest priority basins under design. The Village successfully obtained funding from the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and continues to seek additional funding from different agencies to offset construction and construction engineering inspection costs. The projects will be constructed according to their priority in the SMP.

SHARED-USE PATHS

As one of the adopted projects of the Village's Transportation Master Plan approved in 2018, the Kendall Drive Shared Use Path (SUP) project will connect Ludlam Road to Red Road. The project consists of removing the existing five-foot-wide concrete sidewalk and constructing an 8-foot-wide asphalt path designed to accommodate two-way pedestrian and bicycle traffic. The path will be on the south side of Kendall Drive, with graded and sodded swales and additional street trees to beautify and add to the canopy. This project will enhance the SUP network in Pinecrest by adding connectivity to existing and future facilities. Miami-Dade County is considering a SUP along the north bank of the C-2 canal between US 1 and Ludlam Road, providing another point of connection to this network. The Village Council authorized the design of the Ludlam Road SUP and the Florida Department of Transportation granted \$1 M for its construction. This project will provide a SUP on Ludlum Road from Howard Drive to the C-2 canal. The Village will advertise to acquire engineering design services, with design expected to begin in the first quarter of 2024. Design and permitting are anticipated to take up to twelve months.

CORAL PINE PARK PHASE 2

In 2014, the Village Council adopted the Coral Pine Park Master Plan and divided the construction of the approved improvements into two phases. Phase 1 was completed in 2016 with the construction of the tennis center. Phase 2 includes a new multi-purpose room, an updated restroom facility, a walking path, and an exercise station. This project is expected to be complete in 2025.



GARY MATZNER PARK

The final design for Gary Matzner Park, as adopted by the Village Council, includes vast open spaces, natural play areas, a covered playground, a walking path, a restroom shelter, parking, preservation of numerous specimen trees, and a park gateway that welcomes residents and guests to the northern entrance of the Village. The park landscape will include all native species and create a canopy and backdrop for families and friends to gather and be surrounded by nature as they enjoy the park's beauty and amenities. The Village has delegated Keith Associates with the task of completing construction documents based on the approved conceptual design for this facility. Once construction for this project should take approximately twelve months.

SUNILAND PARK IMPROVEMENTS

Suniland Park has received several updates to its lighting infrastructure. LED lights are installed throughout the park and the parking lot, all athletic fields, the basketball courts and batting cages, the gazebo and main building, and the walking path. The basketball courts have been resurfaced and offer both basketball and pickleball lines to accommodate both sports. The parking lot landscape beautification project is underway and expected to be complete by March.

PINECREST GARDENS LAKEVIEW TERRACE & RAMP RENOVATION

The investigative phase conducted by an architecture firm specializing in historical properties is complete. They are currently working on the construction documents and an invitation to bid for the construction will be advertised in the first quarter of 2024.

PINECREST GARDENS CYPRESS HALL DECK

A new deck will be constructed outside of Cypress Hall in Pinecrest Gardens. The construction of the 835-square-foot deck is underway and is anticipated construction will be complete by March 2024.

ACHIEVEMENTS: ENHANCING SAFETY IN PINECREST

- Pinecrest is one of the first municipalities to approve school zone speed detection cameras. •
- Officer Pete Panagakos was honored as Pinecrest's Officer of the Year this past December for his decisive action in a domestic-related shooting.
- Officer Jeanette Cobo founded H.E.A.R.T. (Homeless Encounter Assistance Reach Team) within the Pinecrest Police Department. Since 2016, her innovative efforts and collaborative spirit have significantly enhanced support for the homeless community in Pinecrest and beyond.

THE 9 PM ROUTINE: A DAILY SAFETY CHECK

The 9 PM Routine serves as a nightly reminder for residents to perform a quick safety check before going to bed. This involves ensuring that all vehicles are securely locked and keys are removed. This simple action reduces the risk of vehicle theft, which in the Village, accounts for over 80% of such incidents. Regularly performing this check not only protects your property but also upholds our shared commitment to maintaining a safer Pinecrest.



PINECREST BICYCLISTS SAFETY TIPS

Pinecrest's quiet, tree-lined streets attract bicyclists from around Miami-Dade County. We've all exercised patience and deep breathing while trailing a sizable group of cyclists occupying multiple traffic lanes while asking ourselves, can they do that?

During weekends, the risk of bicycle crashes sharply escalates, mirroring the daunting ascent of Mont Ventoux in the Tour de France. With this in mind, this article highlights some key points of Florida's bicycle laws to promote safer interactions between cyclists and motorists.

Let's face it: Pinecrest is a popular destination for anyone who wants a quick escape from Miami to enjoy the outdoors.

Unfortunately, Pinecrest Police responded to 12 cyclist-related crashes on our roadways in the past two years. To reduce bicycle-related accidents, the police department leverages community-police partnerships to educate residents about cycling safety.

It's essential to recognize that bicycles are legally considered vehicles in Florida. This means cyclists have the same rights and duties as car drivers, with some specific regulations. Fla. Stat. § 316.02065 lists rules designed to protect cyclists and promote general traffic safety. We encourage everyone to familiarize themselves with local bicycle laws. While all bicycle laws are significant, the following are critical for safe cycling:

Firstly, cyclists are expected to ride with vehicular traffic. Riding against traffic increases the risk of accidents, as drivers entering and exiting roadways do not expect bicycle traffic from the opposite direction.

Another critical aspect of road safety is understanding lane usage. Cyclists traveling slower than other traffic should ride in the rightmost through lane, except to pass, make a left turn, or avoid hazards. This positioning enhances predictability and visibility. However, cyclists may use the entire lane when the lane is too narrow for a bicycle and a car to travel side by side.


Secondly, cyclists have the same responsibilities as motorists regarding traffic signals and stop signs. Cyclists and drivers must yield the right of way appropriately and obey all traffic control devices.


For sidewalk riders, cyclists have the rights and duties of pedestrians. They should yield to pedestrians and give an audible signal before passing them.


Bicycle equipment is important. Bicycles must have proper lighting after sunset. A front white and rear red light is mandatory for visibility and safety during non-daylight hours.

Notably, about 60 percent of fatal bicycle crashes in Florida occur during these hours.

Additionally, all cyclists under 16 years of age must wear a helmet that meets federal safety standards. Understanding and respecting these laws can significantly reduce accidents. Let's work together to keep our streets safe and enjoyable for everyone, whether on two wheels or four.




COMMUNITY EVENT THE PINECREST CAR SHOW

PUBLIC GARDENS AS MUSEUMS THE CROTON COLLECTION



"A museum is a non-profit, permanent institution in the service of society and its development, open to the public, which acquires, conserves, researches, communicates and exhibits the tangible and intangible heritage of humanity and its environment for education, study and enjoyment."

- International Council of Museums (ICOM) in 2022

Public gardens have many functions: as beautiful spaces and places for sensory enrichment and tranquility, to provide environments that are supportive of psychological and physical well-being, as resources for horticultural and biological education, as settings for art, culture, and social events, and as repositories of historical landscapes and plants.

Whether intentionally designed or randomly assembled, gardens contain plants that are usually categorized by their genetic relationships, cultivation requirements, places of origin, uses, or display qualities. Public gardens are museums that conserve and exhibit living plants. Pinecrest Gardens staff identify and curate collections and are involved in their protection and preservation.

Education and public outreach also play large roles. A public garden can gain national accreditation and recognition as a museum by the American Alliance of Museums and join the ranks of the organization's many well-known institutional members. The rigorous application process involves significant planning and commitment.

At Pinecrest Gardens, plants are comprehensively identified and inventoried. Additional information, such as whether a species is threatened or endangered, its country of origin, and its garden history is recorded in a botanical database. The data is useful for Pinecrest Gardens educational programming, for visitors, and the horticultural staff. Some of the plants are easily sorted into collections. Palms or succulents are examples, or perhaps the fine old-growth Bald cypresses in the lower gardens. One plant species that has been a part of the Pinecrest Gardens landscape for many years and is recognizable to visitors is the Garden Croton, Codiaeum variegatum.

Colorful crotons became extremely popular in South Florida landscaping during the nineteen twenties and thirties. Plant breeders developed dozens of varieties around the same time as the creation of Parrot Jungle in 1936. Pinecrest Gardens still displays many fine crotons, where two spectacular varieties, Milky Way and Fire Breath originated. Like many other gardening fads, the popularity of crotons has waxed and waned over the years. Some varieties that fell out of commercial production are preserved in the gardens and nurseries of dedicated hobbyists and occasionally can be found as survivors on older residential properties.

Pinecrest Gardens is planning to identify, inventory, and expand its fine croton plantings to develop a nationally recognized collection. This is but one step on the lengthy path towards museum accreditation. Pinecrest Gardens now has a full-time collections specialist who will substantially assist with defining what we have, composing a Croton collections plan, and creating a collections management strategy, all as part of raising the Pinecrest Gardens landscape and horticultural status.

With generous funding support provided by The Abbott Family, and Stan Smith Foundation, in 2022 Pinecrest Gardens invested in the tools necessary to build a collections development program. And in 2023 with a donation from the Pinecrest Garden Club, the Pinecrest Gardens team consulted with experts to help identify many croton varieties. Additional club and private donor funding will help in the acquisition of plants to expand the Pinecrest Gardens display collection.

ART IN THE GARDENS GALLERY CRAWL: OPENING MARCH 16, 5 PM

This spring, Pinecrest Gardens is abuzz with creativity as it welcomes distinctive art exhibitions, short play readings, and music concerts that seamlessly blend with the natural beauty of the surroundings. From monumental bamboo-crafted bird sculptures to a celebration of local artists and an exploration of the surreal landscapes of Florida and sustainable elevation sculptures, each exhibit offers a unique perspective on the intersection of art and nature.

OOLITE ARTS AT THE GARDENS

With the mission of connecting Miami's art community while promoting local artists, this exhibition shows the artworks of Oolite Arts Organization's resident artists. Oolite Arts is Miami's largest artist support organization. This exhibition is curated by Hartvest Project in partnership with Oolite Arts' curators.

CURRENTS BY MICHAEL GRAY

Currents is a collection of works loosely following the artist's family history while referencing natural disasters, allegorical mythologies, and natural systems set in the surreal landscape of Florida. The artist draws upon myth, history, augury, anomaly, and salvaged photographs to attempt to reconstruct a complex pastiche identity that crosses between naturalist, outsider, father, son, Miamian, and swamp-dweller.
