# a MESSAGE to the VILLAGE

#### MAYOR'S MESSAGE Joseph M. Corradino

The Village of Pinecrest is introducing a Peacock Mitigation Program starting October 1, 2023. The program seeks to strike a balance between addressing concerns of residents who view the birds as a nuisance and respecting the sentiments of those who appreciate their presence.

The initiative aligns with Miami-Dade County regulations, permitting property owners to make decisions about peafowl on their premises while facilitating municipalities to humanely manage the population. Visit www.pinecrest-fl.gov/peacock for more information about the program.

Teaming up with Dr. Don Harris, an esteemed veterinarian specializing in avian and exotic species, Pinecrest is adopting a humane approach. Dr. Harris will conduct a low-impact vasectomy procedure on male peacocks, ensuring minimal disruption to their well-being.

Pinecrest's plan is centered around a clean, brief, and minimally invasive vasectomy procedure. This procedure preserves the birds' vibrant appearance while curbing their reproduction. The peacocks will be taken care of in a sanctuary before returning to Pinecrest within a few days.

The measure of success will be the identification of vasectomized peacocks via leg bands. This approach mirrors successful population control efforts for feral cats, where spaying or neutering, marking, and return to their original habitat has been effective. It's important to recognize that this program requires time to yield results.

The program reflects Pinecrest's aspiration to foster harmony between the peacock population and the community, catering to various residents'

In line with these efforts, residents are encouraged to avoid feeding the peacocks, which can disrupt their natural behaviors. Pinecrest's comprehensive approach reflects a community-driven commitment to resolving this issue while promoting the welfare of both residents and peacocks.

# FLORIDA'S

alive and thriving. Which in turn, keeps the planet alive and thriving. On a smaller scale, imagine walking out into your yard to the sights and sounds of the Everglades.

The idea is catching on in some circles. In the Village, there is quiet movement that is gaining traction. It encourages education about planting native species and is spearheaded by Pinecrest resident Charlie Reverte.

On a municipal level, Reverte was happy to let elected officials tour his home and learn more about planting native. Native plant means a species of plants that were originally here before human development. An example of this would be planting a Dade County Pine versus a Poinciana, which is not native to this area and does not support our wildlife.

The Village passed a resolution unanimously in support of the Village planting native plant species during the April 2023 Village Council meeting. Vice Mayor Anna Hochkammer sponsored the resolution and believes this is not only a way to help save Biscayne Bay, but an opportunity for creativity. The resolution does not dictate what is planted on private property.

"Our eyes are often trained to appreciate exotics and natives, but well-planned native landscaping can look tidy and attractive while requiring little or no chemicals, fertilizer, or watering. If we set aside some of our preconceived notions about 'needing' lawns everywhere, the creative possibilities are endless," said Hochkammer.

Reverte planted more than 200 species of natives on his property about two and half years ago. While touring his yard, he said that he grew up in South Florida hiking in the Everglades as a boy scout and learned about South Florida's unique ecosystems at Mast Academy where he attended high school.

When he moved back to South Florida, he wanted the same feeling in his backyard. More than that, he wants his children to have the same knowledge and appreciation for the role planting native creates in a thriving ecosystem.

His children get to travel into a special secret garden made up of natives right in their backyard.

Lights speckles through the canopy of a small, hidden trail behind Reverte's home creating a prism-like effect that reminds one of wonder and curiosity.

"I wanted to show everyone that you can plant native trees in your house, specifically children, because you want to pass on this knowledge from generation to generation," said Reverte. "My kids love to play in the garden and learn about the plants and the butterflies."

Reverte explained that the canopy of the hidden garden is made up of cypress, southern red maple, pond apple, satin leaf, and

"An important thing to emphasize is maximizing the diversity of different native plants you use," Reverte said. "Each plant has an important ecosystem function and relationship with wildlife that depend on it."

The ground layer of his yard is teeming with wildlife and is made up of wild coffee, wax myrtle, saltbush, coontie, giant leather fern, and many others. The native plants do not need any mowing or landscaping. The beauty of the native plant concept is natural, unmanicured growth, while using plants that are adequate for

No pesticides, fertilizers or other chemicals are used in his yard either, since native plants are adapted to our environment. Many of the plants he used also attract dragonflies which eat mosquitoes. To help raise awareness of native plants, Reverte also started the Reforest Miami website and social media effort and serves on the board of the Dade County chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society, which meets monthly at Pinecrest

As a side, remember that the use of most fertilizers is banned in Miami-Dade from May 15 to October 31 each year. Nitrogen and phosphorous run-off make Biscayne Bay sick when it is rainy.

Although Reverte is passionate about native plants being reintroduced into our ecosystem, this labor of love was created with the help of Howard Tonkin who owns Urban Habitat, a native species only landingscaping firm.

He helped Reverte naturally fortify the canal bank next to his home from flooding and salt water intrusion.

Reverte lives off the Pinecrest canal and has cypress tree, and pond apple trees growing on the bank to create a fortified barrier for storm events and potential hurricanes. Invasive iguanas had weakened the bank walls by burrowing into them causing degradation.

"These cypress trees are buttressed, and they have what's called knees. They can come up out of the ground and they're very hurricane resistant and they're also salt tolerant. So, if there ever was brackish water to flood up here in a hurricane, they can survive it," said Reverte. "I hear an adult tree can drink up to 800 gallons of water per day."

Tonkin explained that his business's core value is making a positive contribution to society. An Australian who moved to Miami in 2000, he was taken aback by the devastation of our Dade County Pines and the condition of Biscayne Bay. He dedicates his life to bringing pines back to Miami-Dade County and water conservation. Two topics that align with the Village's Strategic Priorities.

Tonkin acknowledges that native plant projects are not a sweeping answer to climate change but proposes that small changes can add up to big ones.

"We have less than 2% [Dade County Pines] remaining outside of Everglades National Park. So that means all the wildlife, all the birds that would have lived there and depended on it for migration are all gone," said Tonkin. "So even a small change you can make right now and make a big difference."





The Village of Pinecrest's Master Plan calls for increasing the tree canopy, so you will see more native plants coming soon to a roadside and cul-de-sac near you. For more information about native plants, please visit www.pinecrest-fl.gov/native.

The YAC aims to empower youth by providing a platform for the often-underrepresented teen demographic. YAC fosters community involvement through various volunteer opportunities and educates its members about the inner workings of local government.

This past year, YAC members volunteered at the Veterans Day event, Nights of Lights, the Antique Car Show, and other community activities. Additionally, the YAC has hosted a variety of YOUth series—where a member brings in an expert to speak on a topic pertinent to youth—ranging from financial literacy to the Florida ecosystem to the LGBTQ+ fight for equality to organ donation and physical fitness.

Financial Advisor Ryan James spoke to the YAC about financial literacy

"I find it very important to engage with and educate youth... [awareness] benefits the community as youth learn skills that they otherwise might not be taught," said James.

lvette Cano, Director of Education at Everglades National Park held a YOUth Series Workshop on Nature Preservation in the Everglades.

"Facilitating connections for students with the outdoors is essential to the health of both our kids and our planet. When students grow up understanding and appreciating natural spaces, they are more likely to fully enjoy and protect those places," said Cano.

Julia Reich, chair of YAC for the 2022-2023 term, lauds the youth council for giving young community members the "opportunity to learn about local government through direct interaction with Pinecrest departments," and appreciates the "mentorship of Councilmember Katie Abbott who oversees all that [YAC] accomplishes."

To learn about local government, YAC members attend and participate in Village Council meetings. YAC members also have the opportunity to tour the police department, the public works department and the like, to learn more about what keeps the Village running smoothly.

The YAC was established in 2009 by former Mayor Cindy Lerner. Although YAC is always looking for ways to improve, Lerner s goals—to increase youth s voice in the community as well as provide a deeper understanding of local government—are still at the forefront of the YAC s mission.

YAC s three main objectives are to learn about local government, volunteer in local events, and develop leadership skills," said Councilmember Katie Abbott.

# HOW TO PROTECTBISCAYNE BAY

Over the years, Biscayne Bay has faced significant contamination issues, primarily due to pollution from various sources, including urban runoff, sewage discharge, agricultural runoff, industrial waste, and boat-related activities. Contamination in Biscayne Bay can have severe impacts on the ecosystem, wildlife, and human health. It can lead to harmful algal blooms, oxygen depletion, loss of seagrass beds, and threatens marine species, including fish, birds, and marine mammals.

Individual choices can play a crucial role in improving the health of Biscayne Bay. Here are some steps individuals can take to contribute to the improvement of the bay's water quality:

- Reduce water usage: Conserving water at home helps decrease the amount of wastewater entering the bay.
- Proper disposal of waste: Avoid disposing of trash, chemicals, and hazardous materials down storm drains or into the bay.
- Use eco-friendly products: Harmful chemicals from these products can wash into the bay through stormwater runoff.
- Car maintenance: Properly maintain your vehicle to prevent oil and other automotive fluids from leaking and contaminating the roads, which eventually end up in the bay.

# POLICE DEPARTMENT

## TOP PRIORITY

The safety of our residents is a top priority. A significant portion of our public safety mission is accomplished through effective policing, crime prevention, and positive police-community relations. Although crime rates remain amongst our lowest, community involvement is critical. The efforts of committed residents and local businesses protect our community from various property crimes.

Common sense crime prevention tips offer proven, cost-effective methods to deter criminal activity. The 9 PM Routine, for example, reminds vehicle owners to lock car doors, secure their belongings, and not leave the vehicle's key fob inside the car.

Criminals steal cars for a few reasons. In some cases, stolen vehicles are used to commit other crimes or sold for parts. In South Florida, stolen vehicles are also shipped off and sold overseas. Some car thieves use the car for a joy ride and later abandon them. In all cases, the car owner feels angry, vulnerable, frustrated, or afraid. Fortunately, vehicle owners can minimize the likelihood of being a victim of theft.

Pinecrest Police frequently broadcast crime prevention material and safety tips through its e-newsletter, social media, and SaferWatch. Crimes reduction and problem-solving efforts begin with effective communication between police and the community.

Pinecrest Police encourages you to contact the police anytime you see anything suspicious or if you have been the victim of a crime. It is always convenient for us to respond to your home and assist. The more we learn from our residents, the better prepared we will be to address issues. Residents should use the non-emergency number to report suspicious activity. In an emergency, always dial 911.

Police operations are planned to promote public safety. Our officers interact with the community daily while conducting watch orders, park details, and "park and walks" throughout the Village. Police also use traffic enforcement to increase public safety. On occasion, attempted traffic stops in residential areas resulted in vehicles fleeing from police, potentially preventing criminal acts. Another tactic includes deploying police speed detection trailers and police cruisers at strategic locations to increase police presence.

In addition to regular police duties, the Community Resource Team (CRT) works closely with residents and local businesses to promote crime prevention and police-community relations. CRT is heavily involved in Neighborhood and Business Watch Programs, organizing groups of residents and businesses to collaboratively deter, detect, and reduce the opportunities for crime.

The police and the community have an interdependent relationship with a common goal – public safety. If we work together, the criminals will not stand a chance. Remember, put into practice crime prevention, get connected with the police, and follow us on social media.


# DEPARTURE SIGHT TRIANGLE

Safety is the primary driving force for the development and implementation of civil engineering standards. These standards have evolved over the last century as more and more motorized vehicles crowd the nation's roads. Intersections are the most common location for accidents. Drivers generally have three options when approaching an intersection: turn left, turn right, or go straight. With four approaches to an intersection there are 12 opportunities for a collision.

One of the most important elements engineers design for at intersections is sight distance. This is the distance a driver can clearly see oncoming traffic. The posted speed of the intersecting road, the number of lanes the driver is looking over to see oncoming traffic, and the location of the stopped driver determine what is called a **sight triangle**. See the image above.


The green-colored area is the sight triangle. Sight triangles, shall, where practical, be clear of obstructions that would prohibit a driver s view of potentially conflicting vehicles. Note, the triangle includes portions of the pavement. So, parked vehicles in the road or next to the road are potential obstructions. This is one of the reasons parallel parking is prohibited within a certain distance of an intersection.

These standards have evolved over time and are codified by the State. Details can be found in the Manual of Uniform Minimum Standards for Design, Construction and Maintenance for Streets and Highways (also referred to as the Florida Greenbook) published by Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). It provides criteria for public streets, roads, highways, bridges, sidewalks, curbs and curb ramps, crosswalks, bicycle facilities, underpasses, and overpasses used by the public for vehicular and pedestrian travel for all projects not on the state and national highway systems.

### **STORMWATER**

The Village commissioned a Stormwater Master Plan (SMP) in 2014 and adopted the plan in 2015. The adoption of a Stormwater Master Plan is an absolute necessity to obtain funding for projects from all levels of government agencies - county, state and federal. The SMP analyzed the Village's drainage needs and adopted a priority list of 15 basins (one being the highest priority). The Village currently has one portion of the SMP under construction.

The Palmetto Island Drainage Project began in January of this year and was completed July 3, 2023. The Village also has five basins under design (bordered in green and numbered) as shown in the map.

The Village recently applied for a FEMA grant that would allow all five of these projects to be constructed. The status of the grant award is still pending, but the Village's application met all the criteria of the grant. This grant application is for nearly \$18M and would pay for 80% of design, construction, and construction administration for the five basins indicated in the map. Design of these projects will be completed by the end of the year and allows the Village to seek funding for projects where planning and engineering is advanced enough that construction can begin within a very short time from all agencies should the FEMA grant not be awarded. To assist with reviewing the SMP the Basin Priority number and Basin name follows:

## POTABLE WATER PROJECT UPDATE

At the time of this publication, 14 of 16 sub-phases were conveyed to Miami-Dade Water and Sewer Department (WASD). Phases 1A, 1B, 1C, 1D, 2A, 2B, 2D, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 4B, 4C, 4D. This represents 77% of the total project length. All of the property owners in the aforementioned sub-phases have been provided step-by-step connection instructions.

**Phase 2C** is the largest (17,035 LF) and most significant (17% of all pipe installed) of the sub-phases. Additionally, the majority of this phase is within the salinity line and where many wells have been infiltrated by salt water.

All testing and pavement/sod restoration is complete. The Bac-T tests have all passed and the Florida Department of Health (FDOH) letter has been provided. The as-builts have been submitted and we expect one round of corrections. Once the as-builts are accepted by WASD this sub-phase will be conveyed – we expect by 8/30/23 – at this point 94% of the project will be available for resident connections.

**Phase 4A** was the last sub-phase to be permitted by WASD and construction did not begin until March 31, 2023. Consequently, it will be the last sub-phase conveyed. All field work for pipe installation is complete - except for 7 tie-ins. Pressure testing, flushing, and Bac-T sampling is complete. Pavement restoration, swale restoration, as-builts, and FDOH letter will not allow conveyance until the end of August.

## PINECREST GARDENS TERRACE & RAMP RENOVATION

This project is for the renovations to the Pinecrest Gardens Lakeview Terrace and ramp which includes the assessment of existing structures, geotechnical exploration, and mitigation of the subsoil conditions resulting in the failure of the foundation of the terrace and ramp. The repairs will consist of removing mosaic tiles, leveling floor of the terrace and repairing the incline of the entrance ramps. Mosaic tiles on the terrace will be replaced in the pattern in which they were originally installed.

The project is currently in the investigative phase through an architecture firm specializing in historical properties. Once a determination is made of the necessary work, construction documents will be designed and an Invitation to Bid for the construction will be advertised. It is estimated that this work will be completed by June 2024.

### PINECREST GARDENS CYPRESS HALL DECK

A new outdoor deck will be constructed by February 2024 outside of Cypress Hall. The design is complete and the construction contract is expected to be awarded in September 2023.

### **CORAL PINE PARK PHASE 2**

In 2014, Village Council adopted the Coral Pine Park Master Plan and divided the construction of the approved improvements into two phases. Phase 1, which included a new tennis center and playground, was completed in 2016. This project is for the design of Phase 2 which includes a new multi-purpose room, updated restroom facility, walking path, exercise station, and more. The design and construction documents are completed, a bid will be advertised and awarded for the construction in the fall of 2023. This project is expected to be completed in February 2025.

#### GARY MATZNER PARK

In 2021, Village Council approved the acquisition of the 3.76 acre two-parcel site located on the southeast corner of Kendall Drive between 67 Avenue and 65 Court. In May 2023, the Village Council approved the conceptual design for the future park. The final design, as adopted by Village Council, includes vast open spaces, natural play areas, a covered playground, a walking path, a restroom shelter, parking, preservation of numerous specimen trees, and a park gateway that welcomes residents and guests to the northern entrance of the Village. The park landscape will include all native species and create a canopy and backdrop for families and friends to gather and be surrounded by nature as they enjoy the park's beauty and amenities. The Village will issue the Request for Proposals (RFP) for construction documents and park development in late summer to be awarded in early fall 2023. Construction for this project should take approximately twelve months.

# SUNILAND PARK IMPROVEMENTS

Suniland Park has received several updates to the lighting infrastructure. New LED lights have been installed in the parking lot, and athletic field 2 and 3 will have new LED lights retrofitted to the existing sports lighting posts. With this installation, the LED light conversion project will be completed at Suniland Park and includes all major lighting sources having been converted to LED. This includes all athletic fields, basketball courts, multipurpose room, gazebo, and exterior building lights. Upcoming projects include the completion of the parking lot landscape beautification in the fall of 2023 and the installation of a golf cage in the winter of 2024.

### SHARED-USE PATHS


As one of the adopted projects of the Village's Transportation Master Plan approved in 2018, the Kendall Drive Shared Use Path (SUP) project will connect SW 67 Avenue to Red Road. The project consists of removing the existing 5-foot wide concrete sidewalk and constructing an 8-foot asphalt path designed to accommodate two-way pedestrian and bicycle traffic. The path will be located entirely on the south side of Kendall Drive, with some of the new street trees located on the north side. In November 2021, Village Council approved commencement of the construction design which is expected to be completed in spring 2023.

Shared-use paths are paved facilities physically separated from motorized vehicular traffic by an open space or barrier. They are used by bicyclists, pedestrians, runners, skaters, etc. One of the adopted projects of the Village's Transportation Master Plan approved in 2018, the 67th Avenue Shared Use Path (SUP) will run from Snapper Creek to SW 136th Street. The construction of the 8'-wide asphalt path will include swale grading to facilitate drainage, and landscape enhancements.

This project will enhance the SUP network in Pinecrest by adding connectivity to existing and future facilities. The Village is coordinating with Miami-Dade County on a project that will connect US 1 with the northern terminus of Ludlam at the C-100 Canal. The county is also considering a SUP along the north bank of the C-100 between US 1 and Ludlam, providing another point of connection to this network.

Village Council authorized the design of the Ludlam path, however construction is pending until a funding source is identified. The Village will advertise to acquire engineering design services in summer 2023, with design expected to begin in October 2023. The design and permitting is anticipated to take up to twelve months.

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The Parks and Recreation Department manages the Pinecrest Community Center and all public parks in the Village including Coral Pine Park, Flagler Grove Park, Evelyn Greer Park, Red Road Linear Park, Suniland Park, Veterans Wayside Park, Village Green and Gary Matzner Park.





# THE CURIOUS CHILD

Attending high-quality educational programs and regular participation can lead to improved social and emotional competencies, including prosocial behavior, intrinsic motivation, better concentration efforts, and higher sense of self-worth. As school gets back into full swing this fall, Pinecrest Gardens joins the education mix with a number of programs geared toward expanding the minds of our youth.

One of the longest standing programs at Pinecrest Gardens, Little Lizards, offers different activities relating to monthly themes every Wednesday afternoon. Geared towards children ages 4 through 12 years of age, this outdoor program allows its participants to explore, create and imagine while learning about the wonders of nature.

For those kids who are more inclined to enjoy art and science, Pinecrest Gardens' educational offerings also include an immersive after-school program developed by eco-artist Xavier Cortada. With protecting the planet at the forefront, The Cortada Science Art Academy engages children ages 9 to 12 and inspires creativity and empathy for all things nature through art.

The Parent and Me classes provide daily mommy/daddy friendly activities such as music Mondays, yoga Tuesdays, gymnastic Wednesdays, art Thursdays or dance Fridays. The Parent and Me classes challenge toddlers to learn skills and experience something new every day while providing the parent with the opportunity to interact with and enjoy watching their little one grow through new experiences.

Homeschooling is an excellent option for families who want to take an active role in their child's education. However, homeschooling can be a bit isolating, and some families may feel like they're missing out on the social aspects of school. This is where homeschool coops come in. In addition to the programs previously mentioned, Pinecrest Gardens is home to the a homeschool co-op called Paper Tree House for Fun. A homeschool co-op is a group of families who meet together and work cooperatively to achieve common goals. Organized around academics, social time, the arts, activities, crafts, service work, or projects, this program provides a variety of topics for home learners ages 5+. The program participates in logic games, science with animal encounters, physical activity, and more. The sessions which are led by certified instructors are built around enjoyment of all the amenities that Pinecrest Gardens has to offer and count towards academic programs.

# AVIAN OASIS BY MYTH MAKERS OUTDOOR ART INSTALLATION OPENING

# OUTDOOR ART INSTALLATION OPENING SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 18

Six monumental, site-specific bamboo bird sculptures will descend upon Pinecrest Gardens this November. Towering more than 10 to 30 feet tall each, the birds include a macaw, a sandhill crane, a cockatoo, an owl, a peacock and a painted bunting. The art installation is named Avian Oasis and opens Saturday, November 18, 2023.

Avian Oasis is created by The Myth Makers and pays homage to birds that abound in South Florida. A special nod is given to Pinky the Cockatoo, who performed in the Banyan Bowl on a tiny bicycle when the property housed Parrot Jungle. The cockatoo sculpture will greet visitors as they enter the garden.

Parrot Jungle was founded in 1936 by Franz and Louise Scherr and became a world-famous tourist attraction, one of the first and oldest surviving in Florida, whose visitors included Sir Winston Churchill. The property was an oasis for tropical birds and a getaway for tourists. Today, it is included in the National Register of Historic Places.

Made from bamboo and recycled materials, the six birds will

dot the 14-acre botanical garden until they slowly disintegrate into nature. Sustainable art installations are the norm in Pinecrest Gardens. In 2017, the garden exhibited Stickworks by renowned Environmental Artist Patrick Dougherty and in 2019, Giant Trolls Berta and Terje by Sculpture Artist Thomas Dambo.

The Myth Makers, Donna Dodson and Andy Moerlein, are creating the Avian Avatar sculptures. Their inspiration comes from a mutual love of nature and history. For Dodson, that's specifically the mysterious nature of birds, and for Moerlein it is creating events that leave visual marks in nature. Dodson and Moerlein have completed more than 50 projects together internationally and have received multiple national awards and recognitions.
